

What is Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA)?

Staphylococcus aureus (**S. aureus**) is a bacteria that sometimes lives on the skin of healthy adults without causing illness. Occasionally, **S. aureus** might cause some infections or diseases. **S. aureus** is the most common cause of hospital-associated infections. Some **S. aureus** develop a resistance to certain antibiotics and are named Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus aureus (**MRSA**).

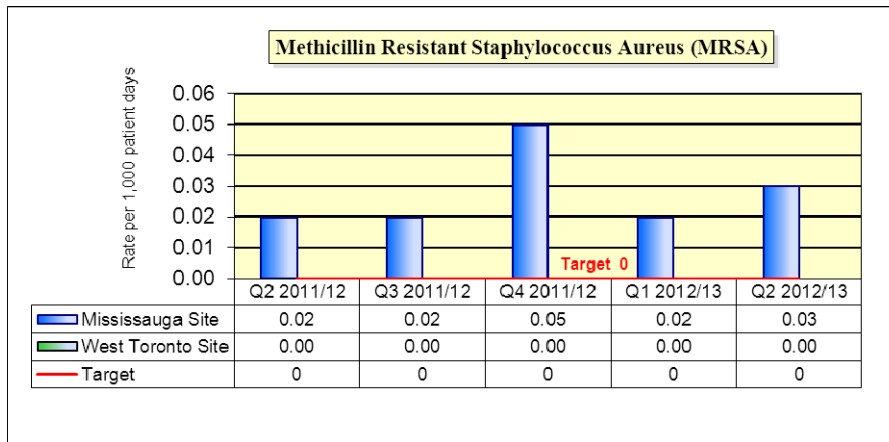
How is MRSA calculated?

MRSA is calculated at a rate per 1,000 patient days.

What is Trillium Health Centre doing to prevent MRSA?

Patients who are at high risk of having MRSA or have been found positive for MRSA are placed on Contact Precautions. Patients may be moved to a more appropriate room and health care providers will wear gloves and gowns when providing direct patient care. Patients and visitors are provided education on their own hand hygiene.

What can patients and their families do to help reduce their chances of infection?
